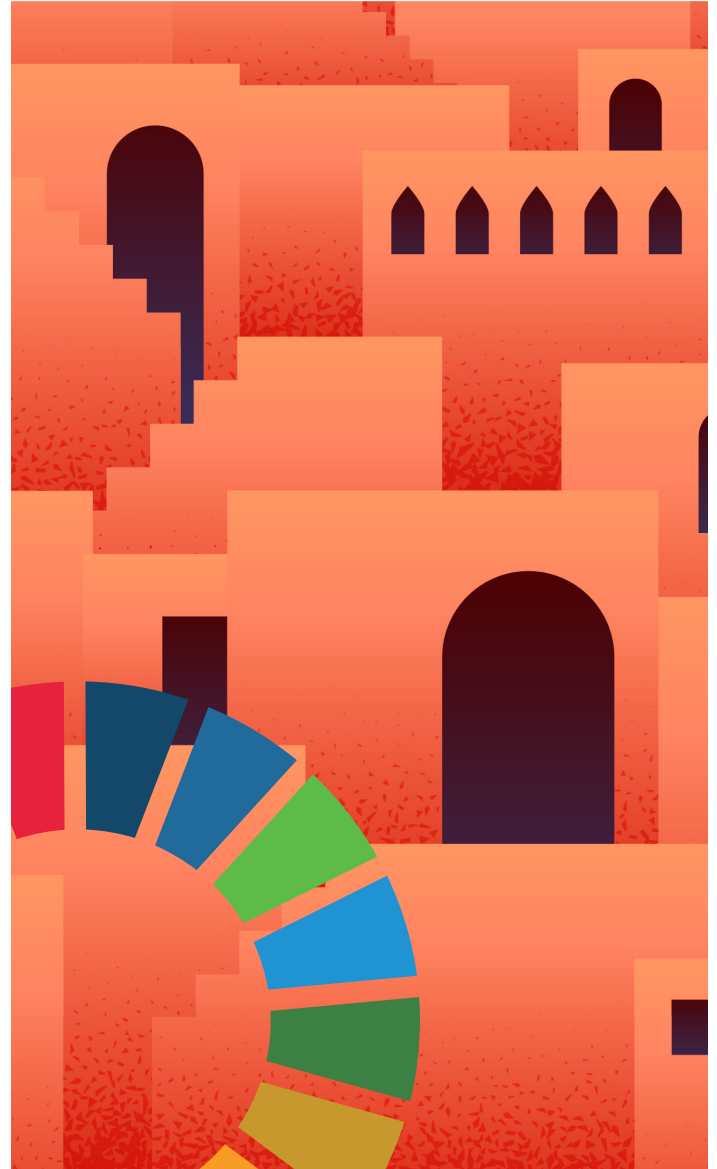
SDG Good Practices: Spotlight on ROAS and ROLAC

Five years into the implementation of the 2030 Agenda and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), many governments, UN entities, international and regional organizations and stakeholders from all sectors have accumulated experiences and lessons learned towards the implementation of the SDGs. From our regions, **four UN-Habitat projects made it to the SDG Good Practices database managed by the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA).** Zoom in on those projects from ROAS and ROLAC.

From December 2020 to March 2021, the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA) launched a [second Open call for submissions of good practices](#), success stories and lessons learned by all stakeholders in the implementation of the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs. The call aimed to unveil the inspiring breakthroughs and success stories showing results and impacts, explore good practices that can be replicated and scaled up, identify the gaps and constraints to better

address them, and understand what is needed to accelerate progress.

The results of the call are available in an [online database of more than 450 SDG good practices](#) implemented by governments and stakeholders from different sectors, and addressing all 17 SDGs. Two projects from ROAS and two others from ROLAC made the cut.

Fight against poverty and vulnerability in Tunisia (ROAS)

SDGS CONTRIBUTION: 1, 2, 3, 5, 10, 11, 16, 17



During 2020, the project supported homeless people and persons evicted from their homes as a result of the COVID-19 outbreak. UN-Habitat supported the Orientation and Social Support Centres in charge of hosting homeless people as well as their Emergency Social Support Service in three major Tunisian cities, namely Tunis, Sousse and Sfax. In collaboration with the Ministry of Social Affairs, UN-Habitat provided homeless people shelter, access to basic hygiene facilities, and socio-psychological support.

The project allowed for the rehabilitation of the women's living unit in the Homeless Center of Tunis, in particular interior and exterior painting, maintenance of sanitary blocks, and maintenance of the

garden. The intervention improved the conditions for hosting of women in the center and generated interventions financed by other donors such as the purchase of beds, furniture for two living units, as well as air conditioning.

The project further allowed the complementary participation of UNHCR who provided support to asylum seekers and refugees during and after the COVID-19 outbreak. UNFPA and UNAIDS also participated, targeting young people, women and girls, and people living with HIV in these centers. To reach more homeless people in the streets, the project made available a vehicle to be used by the Tunis Social Support Centre for their mobile relief teams.

"This was the first project we mobilized under the COVID-19 trust fund last year in Tunisia. The support given by UN-Habitat to the Orientation and Social Support Centres in charge of hosting the homeless people has been selected as a good practice that can be replicated and scaled up to address existing gaps and constraints."

ABJAD Community Centre in Tripoli/Lebanon (ROAS)

SDGS CONTRIBUTION: 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, 11



The Abjad Centre is the first of its kind in Tebbaneh, Tripoli in Lebanon and serves as a sociocultural hub for vulnerable Lebanese, and Syrian and Palestinian refugees in the area. The Centre offers a multitude of activities and services to its members including psychosocial support, life skills workshops and vocational trainings and promotes self-expression through art, theatre and intercultural dialogue. Beneficiaries also access cash assistance and income generating activities especially for women and youth. The working model of the Centre prioritizes leaving no one behind and integrates several SDGs and their respective indicators into the activities and services provided with the aim of improving the lives of the most

marginalized.

Since its establishment in 2018, the Abjad Centre has reached over 5,000 beneficiaries in cooperation with UNICEF, UN Women, UTOPIA (a Lebanese NGO) and the Municipality of Tripoli. The Centre has provided legal protection to more than 150 Syrian refugee and host community families in Tripoli by certifying marriages and registering newborns to help prevent statelessness while protecting households from eviction, which has become more prevalent due to Lebanon's worsening economic situation compounded by the COVID-19 pandemic.

San Nicolás de los Garza is a municipality of half a million inhabitants, located in northern Mexico. It currently faces significant challenges as a result of patterns of accelerated urbanization and metropolitan growth, and the lack of an up-to-date regulatory framework and inter-municipal coordination. San Nicolás de los Garza faces major challenges of environmental sustainability and urban governance and legislation. The municipality approached UN-Habitat to collaborate and develop, in a participatory manner, a roadmap for the sustainable urban development of the city by 2030 in line with the Agenda 2030 and the New Urban Agenda.

The objective is to establish where the urban development of the city should evolve in terms of physical, social, economic

and environmental dimensions in order to contribute, from the local level, to the fulfillment of the SDGs and improve people's quality of life. The project seeks to be a coordinating mechanism that defines guidelines, orientations and strategic actions in the field of urban and territorial development, laying the foundations for a shared future, creating a common framework for action, and strengthening the continuity of long-term urban policies.

Some of the results of the project include the collective definition of a city vision, the innovative design of a participatory strategy including activities focused on the integration of young people, women, children and girls, as well as the use of digital tools to ensure interaction and dialogue with local actors.

Since 2019, the Strategic Projects Agency of the state of Quintana Roo (AGEPRO) and UN-Habitat have been working on the development of the Equity Master Plan which consists of an urban planning strategy that positions public space as a central element for the sustainable development of Cancún. The Plan seeks to develop and consolidate infrastructure, equipment and services to improve the quality of life of residents, directly benefiting about 200,000 people throughout the area of influence of the park.

The Master Plan effectively responds to various urban goals of the SDGs and the principles of the New Urban

Agenda by providing the city of Cancun with a green, safe, inclusive, accessible and quality public space in the most densely populated area of the city.

Some of the expected results include a decrease in socio-spatial segregation in the area, a more diversified public space user base — especially the vulnerable —, reduced criminal acts around the area, an increase in the number of non-motorized trips, an increase in the number of jobs generated by the park's activities, and road safety and good accessibility in the vicinity of the park.

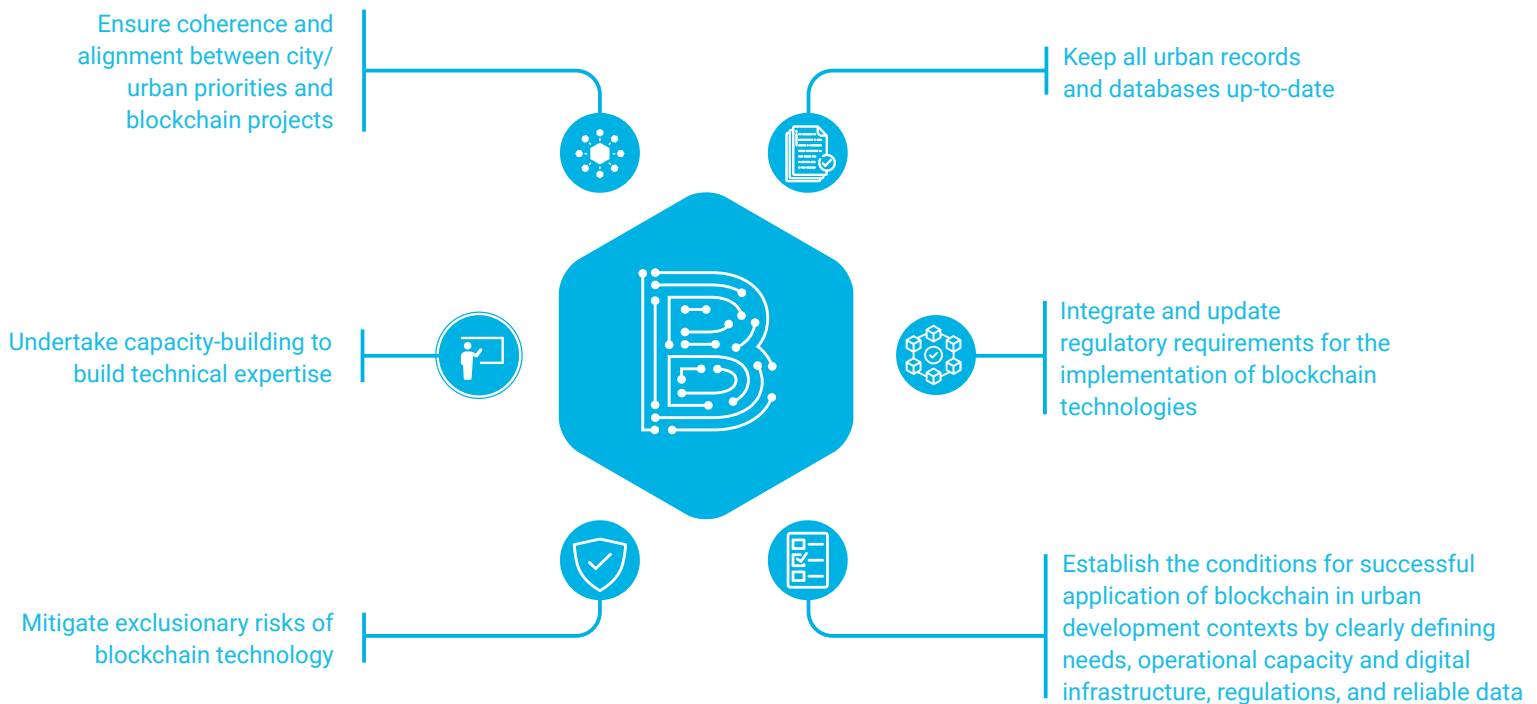
Blockchain for urban development

Have you been attending UN-Habitat's organizational-wide roundtables on innovation and frontier technologies? The fifth installment of the series looked at blockchain technology and its contribution to sustainable urban development.

The UN system is already using blockchain for digital payments, land registration, supply chain, and managing tokens. The roundtable discussed the potential application of blockchain

The discussion featured key recommendations to consider when engaging with blockchain:

for urban development and recommendations for successful adoption. Examples include blockchain for land registration, urban governance, social inclusion, and energy systems, as highlighted in the cases of [Georgia's land title registry](#), [Bitland in Ghana](#), [UN-Habitat and OICT's proposed GolandRegistry initiative in Afghanistan](#), [Brooklyn's Microgrid project](#), [New York's blockchain for change initiative](#) and others.

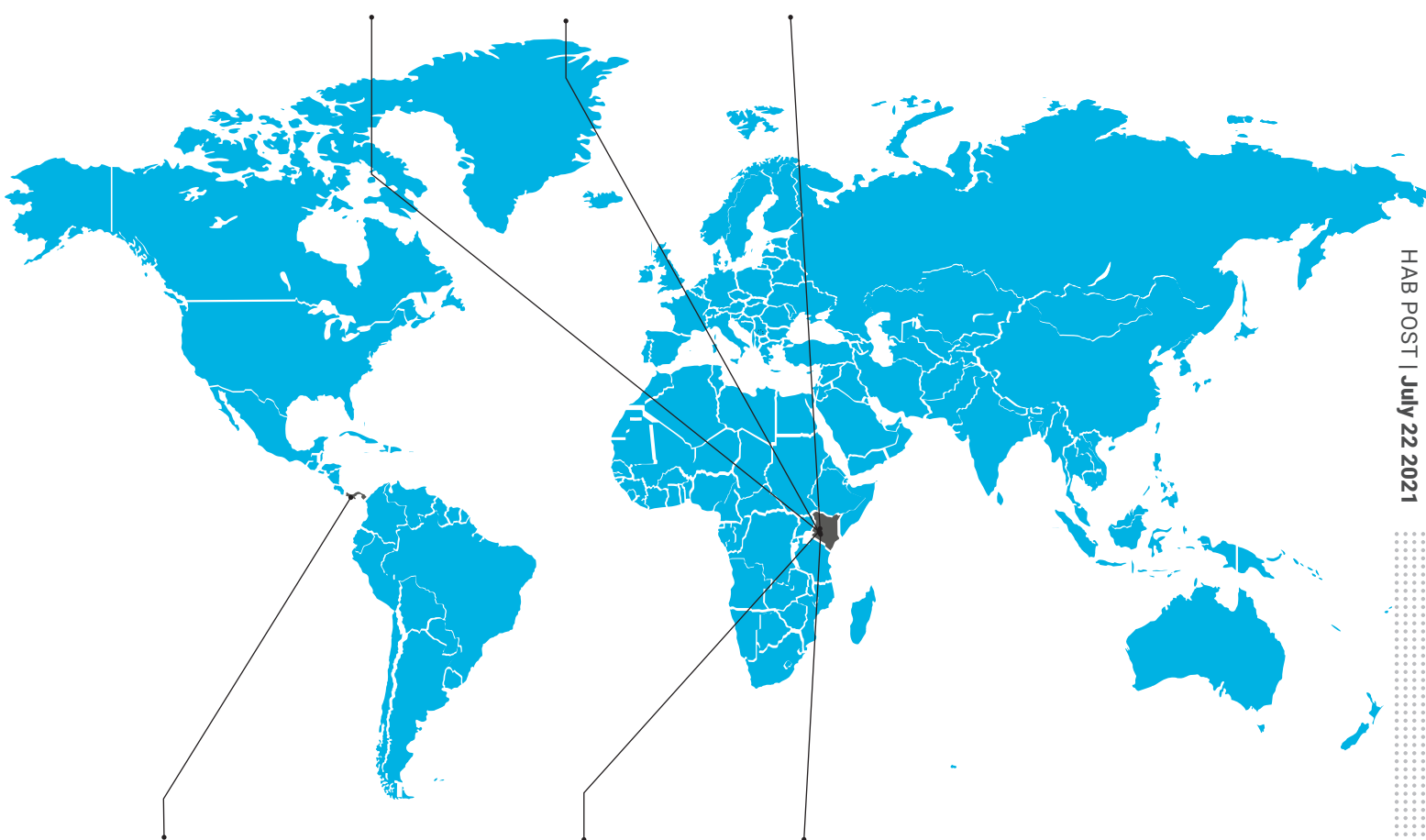

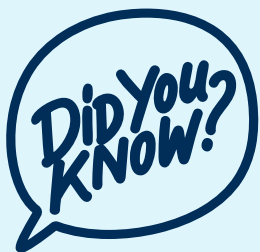
