

Update on the COVID-19 situation in Kenya and plans to reopen the UN Gigiri complex.

- While the numbers of daily infections in Kenya seem to be declining, WHO has indicated that this could be linked to the decline in testing from 8,000 per day at the peak of testing to less than 4,000 today as well as less intense closecontact tracing and selective testing.
- Medical doctors do not recommend travelling by air unless absolutely necessary.
- The COVID-19 treatment facility for UN personnel in Nairobi will open by the end of September.
- The UN complex will reopen earliest December or January at no more than 40 per cent capacity. Those at risk (with underlying conditions) will not be asked to go back to the office immediately. If you have underlying conditions, declare it so that you can be authorized to stay home.
- Personnel will be required to wear masks in the office unless they can effectively maintain a two-meter physical distance, for instance in a private office. Masks will be required in all other common areas of the complex to align with the guidelines of the Kenyan Government.
- Anyone testing positive within the compound will be followed up for contact tracing and will receive medical and psychosocial help.
- The recreation centre started a phased reopening on 7 September.










Urban October: A Month of Action for Better Lives in Cities

At the heart of Urban October usually is the hustle and bustle of preparing huge meetings, the buzz and inspiration from dynamic discussions and crowded lectures, and the fun of children's competitions and outdoor gatherings. These will be replaced in many places by the click of computers logging on to the innovative versions of these familiar events.


Urban October is the month when UN-Habitat's mandate is in the spotlight. It starts with our very own day — World Habitat Day — on the first Monday of the month as mandated by the UN General Assembly. And it closes with another UN mandated event — World Cities Day — which was first celebrated in 2014 as a result of the International Shanghai Expo.

The month is a great opportunity for everyone to work together and to raise awareness of sustainable urbanization and the key role it plays now — and will continue to play — to ensure the world reaches the Sustainable Development Goals and moves towards sustainable development. It is also a great time to recognize good practices and share knowledge on effective urban solutions. UN-Habitat also works hard to ensure there is effective networking and enhanced collaboration among partners. And this year we are of course looking for examples of effective COVID-19 responses in cities where the pandemic has hit the hardest.

While events during Urban October itself can include any subject related to urbanization, there are specific themes

for World Habitat Day and World Cities Day. The theme of World Habitat Day 2020 is Housing For All: For A Better Urban Future and will involve events on all aspects of adequate housing and the right to housing particularly as it is the first line of defence against COVID-19. An action-packed campaign on Housing for All will be running throughout October to raise awareness on the essential role of housing for development, showcase and advocate for key actions, and promote alliances and initiatives.





Valuing our communities and cities

At the other end of the month, World Cities Day is looking at the often unrecognized importance and contribution of communities to our cities under the theme Valuing our Communities and Cities. This comes under the overall World Cities Day theme of Better City, Better Life and again the pandemic has really shown the critical importance of communities and why they need to be integrated into the running of our cities.

What makes Urban October special

The life blood of Urban October are the national, regional and local governments, NGOs, UN agencies, academic institutions, grass roots and community organizations, think tanks, private companies and many more organizations who put together a range of fascinating events in their towns and cities. While the COVID-19 pandemic has made it challenging in some respects, it also presents great opportunities to bring in speakers all over the world who can participate from the comfort of their own homes.

Every year, one main meeting takes place during both World Habitat Day and World Cities Day. The meeting is known as the Global Observance and is attended by our Executive Director and high-level representatives from the host country.

This year, the Global Observance of World Habitat Day on 5 October is being hosted by the Government of Indonesia in Surabaya. We expect to have the usual high-level attendance including ministers and mayors, experts,

diplomats, academics and community leaders along with a video message from the UN Secretary-General. A key event will be the launch of the New Urban Agenda Platform and accompanying discussions, along with workshops on Housing and COVID-19 as well as Housing and Informal Settlements. Other events are being organized from Cameroon to Canada and, time zone permitting, there will be live links to the Global Observance.

Another main event from World Habitat Day is the awarding of the Scroll of Honour winners. The award recognizes outstanding contributions in the field of development including improving urban lives, provision of housing and highlighting the plight of the poor or displaced. There were 61 eligible nominations this year and an internal UN-Habitat Selection Committee made recommendations to the Executive Director. The winners this year are Upcycle Africa (Uganda), Subang

Jaya Municipal Council (Malaysia), Community Impact Nepal (Nepal), the Ministry of Housing and Cities (Colombia), and ECOCASA (Mexico).

At the end of the month, the Global Observance of World Cities Day will be hosted for the first time ever in Africa, by the Government of Kenya. One key event during the Day will be the launch of UN-Habitat's flagship report, the World Cities Report on The Value of Sustainable Urbanization. An accompanying workshop will involve some of the report's authors along with several experts. Other events will include bringing in mayors and ministers to discuss how to work together with communities to co-create cities, a look at communities and public spaces and a workshop on the leadup to the 2021 Africities summit in Kisumu, Kenya featuring governors discussing sustainable initiatives. The Day will mark the end of the 40-day Safer Cities Challenge which will run through Urban October.



What's in for me?

Join in! We encourage everyone at UN-Habitat to get involved — either directly by organizing an event or by working with partners. All the information, logos and merchandise templates are available on the website. We encourage everyone who is holding an event — inside and outside UN-Habitat — to post their Urban October events on the website so that we can provide maximum publicity and generate excitement. There will be stories and updates on the Campaigns on the corporate website, and a lot of social media engagement with messages and material already available for World Habitat Day and World Cities Day.


Contactless credit and debit cards of the United Nations Federal Credit Union (UNFCU) are one way of overcoming the decreasing use of bank notes and coins. And if you want to move on to the next stage and go card-less, you can also download credit and debit cards onto your digital wallet.
